- § Clearer line of sight to development challenges and impact





### Georgia: Strong GDP Growth


FDI led, non-tradable services, construction, agri stagnates, productivity growth from job shedding in public sector

Countercyclical fiscal policy; expansion of public investment

#### **Challenges and Opportunities**


- Ø Past policies led to high growth backed by FDI (and later public investment). BUT non-tradable sectors dominant:
  - § Improve quality of public services
    - Public sector management
    - Health/Education/Social Protection/Sustainability
  - § Reduce unemployment and reliance on social transfers

- Skills
- Infrastructure: transit and energy
- Financial access and SME capacity
